Mathematics

Across the half term children will develop their understanding of:

Angles and finding missing angles:

Shape:

- to calculate the area of parallelograms and triangles
- to recognize that shapes with the same areas can have different perimeters and vice versa
- to calculate, estimate and compare volume of cubes and cuboids using standard units, including centimetre cubed (cm³) and cubic metres (m³), and extending to other units *e.g.* mm³ and km³
- to recognise when it is possible to use the formulae for the volume and area of shapes
- Fractions:
- to use common factors to simplify fractions
- to add, subtract, multiply and divide fractions writing the answer in its simplest form
- associate a fraction with division and calculates decimal fraction equivalents for a simple fraction

Understanding of the World HISTORY: Historical theme: Crime and Punishment

Children will explore crime and punishment in British history that extends chronological knowledge beyond 1066 e.g. from the Anglo-Saxons to the present day

Children will develop a chronologically secure knowledge and understanding of British history, establishing clear narratives within and across the periods they study.

Historical debates: Children will address and devise historically valid questions about change, cause, similarity and difference, and significance and construct informed responses that involve thoughtful selection and organisation of relevant historical information.
