Text: How to Wash a Woolly Mammoth

Instruction writing using imperative verbs to command the reader what to do.

Variety of adverbs to explain how and when to complete each step.

Prepositions of place to describe where to perform an action, for example: under his belly, behind his ears, etc.

Text: UG: Boy Genius of the Stone Age

To convert comic strip style of writing into a complete narrative. Write a setting description of a Stone Age home and the surrounding area.

Write a character description using a thesaurus to accurately attribute adjectives.

Use direct speech punctuated with inverted commas to show what a character is saying in the narrative.

Text: DK Find Out! Stone Age (non-fiction)

Write a non-chronological report about aspects of the Stone Age.

Confidently use scientific and historical vocabulary in the correct context within a report.

Organise ideas into sub-headings and paragraphs.

Organise ideas into captions, diagrams and images to engage the reader and support the writing.

Understanding of the World HISTORY: Changes in Britain from the Stone Age to the Iron Age

Sequence the early ages of Britain chronologically Learn about how life was different during each age, and how it

progressed through the period

Learn about late Neolithic hunter-gatherers and early farmers, for example, Skara Brae

Investigate Bronze Age religion, technology and travel, for example, Stonehenge

Learn about Iron Age hill forts: tribal kingdoms, farming, art and culture

SCIENCE: Light

Pupils should be taught to:

- recognise that they need light in order to see things and that dark is the absence of light
- notice that light is reflected from surfaces
- recognise that light from the sun can be dangerous and that there are ways to protect their eyes
- recognise that shadows are formed when the light from a light source is blocked by an opaque object
- find patterns in the way that the size of shadows change.
